A Call to Action!

Friday, January 06, 2012: MENTOR's Chief Executive Officer David Shapiro participated in a White House symposium yesterday where President Obama announced Summer Jobs+, a new call to action for businesses, nonprofits and government to work together to provide nearly 180,000 employment opportunities for low-income and disconnected youth in the summer of 2012.

The Summit also focused on additional strategies for providing youth with learning and life skills with mentoring prominently featured as one key strategy that requires increased civic participation and funding.

In his remarks, Obama said, "America's young people face record unemployment, and we need to do everything we can to make sure they've got the opportunity to earn the skills and a work ethic that comes with a job. It's important for their future, and for America's."

The program includes a web site, career guide, teacher's guide and student journal, which features seven lessons that are delivered by teachers in schools and after-school youth programs. Additionally, through deep relationships with national nonprofits that lead on education including MENTOR, United Way Worldwide, College Summit and City Year, Deloitte contributes cash, pro bono service and the time of one-on-one mentors to help young people pursue the education and skills they need to succeed in the 21st century.
